

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U.S. Proposes A Tariff-Free World

Comparison to EU Proposal

- The U.S. proposal on consumer and industrial products calls for <u>comprehensive tariff</u> <u>elimination</u>, while the European Union proposal* calls only for tariff compression and reductions and would retain high duties on products of interest to developing countries.
- The U.S. proposal eliminates duties of 5% or less, making more than three-quarters of imports to the U.S., Europe and Japan duty-free by 2010. The EU proposal is vague on cutting low tariffs.
- The U.S. proposal calls for zero tariffs in highly-traded sectors no later than 2010. The EU proposal does not contain a sectoral approach.



Results of U.S. and EU Proposals in 2010 On Sample Consumer & Industrial Goods Tariffs

In 2015, tariffs under EU proposal would remain unchanged from 2010 rates shown above. But under U.S. proposal, <u>all tariffs would be zero</u>.
