Advisory Committee Report to the President, the Congress and the United States Trade Representative on the U.S.-Oman Free Trade Agreement

I. Purpose of the Committee Report

Section 2104 (e) of the Trade Act of 2002 requires that advisory committees provide the President, the U.S. Trade Representative, and Congress with reports required under Section 135 (e) of the Trade Act of 1974, as amended, not later than 30 days after the President notifies Congress of his intent to enter into an agreement.

Under Section 135 (e) of the Trade Act of 1974, as amended, the report of the Advisory Committee for Trade Policy and Negotiations and each appropriate policy advisory committee must include an advisory opinion as to whether and to what extent the agreement promotes the economic interests of the United States and achieves the applicable overall and principle negotiating objectives set forth in the Trade Act of 2002.

The report of the appropriate sectoral or functional committee must also include an advisory opinion as to whether the agreement provides for equity and reciprocity within the sectoral or functional area.

Pursuant to these requirements, the Agricultural Technical Advisory Committee (ATAC) for Trade in Animals and Animal Products hereby submits the following report.

III. <u>Brief Description of the Mandate of the Agricultural Technical Advisory Committee</u> (ATAC) for Trade in Animals and Animal Products

The advisory committee is authorized by Sections 135 (c)(1) and (2) of the Trade Act of 1974 (Pub. L. No. 93-618), as amended, and is intended to assure that representative elements of the private sector have an opportunity to make known their views to the U.S. Government on trade and trade policy matters. The committee provides a formal mechanism through which the U.S. Government may seek advice and information. The continuance of the committee is in the public interest in connection with the work of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and

the Office of the U.S. Trade Representative. This advisory committee provides valuable private sector input.

IV. <u>Negotiating Objectives and Priorities of the Agricultural Technical Advisory</u> Committee (ATAC) for Trade in Animals and Animal Products

A guiding principle for the Animals and Animal Products ATAC in bilateral, regional and multilateral trade negotiations is to improve export opportunities for U.S. dairy, livestock, meat and poultry products through the elimination of unfair tariff and nontariff trade barriers, including veterinary and sanitary restrictions on imports that are not based on sound science. Related to this is the acceptance of FSIS as the certifying authority for meat and poultry exports.

V. Advisory Committee Opinion on Agreement

The Agricultural Technical Advisory Committee (ATAC) for Trade in Animals and Animal Products provides the following comments on the U.S. - Oman Free Trade Agreement (FTA):

Although Oman has not been a large market for U.S. dairy, meat and poultry products, exports are expected to grow with the advantage achieved by this FTA of immediate, duty-free access for all U.S. agricultural commodities. This Committee recognizes and commends this FTA as a useful model for the further liberalization of trade between the United States and countries of the Persian Gulf and elsewhere in the Middle East.

We want to make sure however, that the expiration date requirement for meat be removed under the FTA. This is an issue that the industry has tried to remove from export requirements and be placed into commercial documents to be settled between buyer and seller.

While Oman's commitment to making science-based decisions about SPS measures is good, it falls short of a statement stating Oman accepts USDA's inspection for wholesome and veterinary requirements. Please assure the committee that Oman is committed to more than executing science-based SPS decisions.

With the above noted comments, the ATAC for Animal and Animal Products has adopted the following resolution: "Resolved, the Animals and Animal Products ATAC supports the U.S.-Oman Free Trade Agreement".
