Financial Support for CAFTA-DR:

More than <u>\$3 billion</u> for rural development, labor enforcement, and other priorities

- Millennium Challenge Corporation: The MCC helps to combine aid with trade, directing U.S. assistance funds toward countries with good government and sound trade and economic policies. This includes \$215 million for Honduras already announced. \$175 million for Nicaragua was approved by MCC board on June 13th. Potential of similar amounts next year for Dominican Republic, El Salvador, and Guatemala, depending on appropriation and competition among candidate countries.
- **President's FY2006 Budget Request**: approximately \$200 million for the region in development assistance and capacity-building. Work closely to maximize impact of the CAFTA's Committee on Trade Capacity Building (which includes USG, World Bank, Inter-American Development Bank and other donors).
- Inter American Development Bank: The 2005 loan pipeline related to trade capacity building, including projects under consideration through 2009, is **\$1.6 billion.** The IDB Board will be considering approval this month of a \$117 million loan to Costa Rica. Country break down for total facilities under consideration is:

Costa Rica	\$417 million
Dominican Republic	\$285 million
El Salvador	\$375 million
Guatemala	\$281 million
Honduras	\$142 million
Nicaragua	\$103 million

• The World Bank: The World Bank facilities include over \$1.14 billion in already-approved loans to bolster investments and reforms in support of CAFTA's reform agenda. Loans include financing for infrastructure development (roads, ports and electricity), improvements in the investment climates (customs modernization, reductions in costs of doing business), investments in rural development and in strengthening governance and institutions. These facilities break down as:

Dominican Republic	\$20 million
El Salvador	\$182 million
Guatemala	\$406 million
Honduras	\$183 million
Nicaragua	\$346 million
