International Trade in Services Benefits Michigan's Companies and Workers

IMPORTANCE OF SERVICES TO THE OVERALL U.S. ECONOMY

- The United States is the world's leading services exporting nation. International services markets offer huge opportunities for U.S. firms and their employees, accounting today for nearly one-third of total U.S. exports. Total elimination of global barriers to trade in services could raise U.S. annual income by over \$450 billion or \$6,830 per family of four.
- U.S. services exports have doubled over the past 10 years. The United States recorded a \$66 billion surplus on exports totaling \$381 billion in 2005. This surplus was 22 percent higher than in 2004. Sales through U.S. services companies operating abroad measured \$477 billion in 2003. These international transactions support high-paying jobs across the United States.

IMPORTANCE OF SERVICES TO THE MICHIGAN ECONOMY

- The services sector represents 60 percent of sales by Michigan businesses, employs 72 percent of the workforce, and pays 69 percent of the state's \$132 billion in wages.
- Services exporters in Michigan employed over 61,000 people and generated \$1 billion in export revenues in 2002.² For example:
 - > Professional, scientific and technical industry exporters from Michigan employed 34,800 people and generated \$536 million in export revenues.
 - Telecommunications exporters from Michigan employed 13,000 people and generated \$536 million in export revenues.
 - Publishing industry exporters from Michigan employed 8,300 people and generated \$229 million in export revenues.
- Affiliates of foreign services companies are part of this success. In 2004, companies such as Nestlé (Swiss), Deutsche Telekom (German), and Ikea (Swedish) had over \$4.2 billion invested in property, plants, and equipment (PPE) in Michigan and supported over 41,800 jobs.³
